

Lots of changes. And I believe for the better.



Operating groups and clubs will have an expanded area on the website as well.

One additional change is the elimination of the quarterly printed *TIMETA-BLE*. We were printing 1200 copies annually of the 16 half-page blackand-white issues at a cost of nearly \$1500 or about \$1.23 per copy.

There is also an issue of quality. Small black and white photos don't do justice to the modeling our Division produces.



Instead, we are trying to grow the hobby while we promote the Division and the NMRA.

At the Model Train Show we introduced a 4-color postcard* to distribute at our events and at hobby shops. [500 copies for less than \$100]

It's designed to attract people who may not be aware of what model railroading is all about, but may be looking for a fun past time or family activity. 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PIEDMONT DIVISION 2021 BOARD OF DIRECTORS ELECTION

Piedmont Division members are eligible this year to vote for the following positions on the Piedmont Division's Board: DIRECTOR OF FINANCE, DIRECTOR OF OPERATIONS, and four DIRECTOR-AT-LARGE positions. Each category has a provision for a write-in candidate if you wish to vote for a member who is not on the ballot.

This year's Board of Director's Election will be conducted by US Mail and online through Electionbuddy. This is the voting system used in last year's election. Electionbuddy is also used in SER and National elections.

From your Board of Directors: Due to ongoing concerns about COVID-19, meeting attendance remains down from pre-pandemic levels. The **Piedmont Division's Board of Directors voted unanimously to suspend** the method of voting (in person) outlined in our bylaws. This change is only for the 2021 election and is the only way to ensure that many members have an opportunity to vote in the election.

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The 2021 Piedmont Pilgrimage is Rolling Out



The 19th Annual Piedmont Pilgrimage gets underway with our "virtual tour" video postings and first weekend of inperson tours in on October 23rd. Our "hybrid" layout tour program this year will feature at least five new video tours, and

our original in-person tour schedule listed 37 layouts to be open to the public over the weekends through November 21st. This is obviously a smaller program than in recent years, but not that surprising, given the lingering pandemic concerns.

Since the original open house schedule was released, we have had 4 host cancellations (all **but one due to host's personal health issues), so** our schedule as of this report still features 33 inperson tours. In addition, I have posted a Pil**grimage "tour" webpage with a link to our** YouTube Channel site with all of the 2020 Piedmont Pilgrimage videos for public viewing.

Although we are not producing a "Tour Booklet" for this year's program, we have a printed flyer about the Pilgrimage tours distributed to local hobby shops and so forth.

The layout tour pages are up-to-date on the <u>www.PiedmontPilgrimage.com</u> website including any "Cancelled" notices for all of our open-house tours, and will be posting a tour page for each of our "virtual" tours soon.



Depending on any additional tour cancellations, we may have some timeslots with only one layout (or none) available, but this is beyond our control. We won't be moving tours around, now that our official

schedule has been posted. In the event of a tour cancellation, that tour will be <u>clearly</u> marked as CANCELED on the Pilgrimage website.

Although we did not solicit a main <u>sponsor</u> or other commercial <u>ad-vertisers</u> this year, we currently have paid "pike ads" up on our "Supporters" web page.

A couple of the new videos were provided to us as <u>completed</u> productions by the hosts, and our faithful video editor Craig Knox worked on the others. All of the new videos will be posted to the website on our first day (Oct. 23rd).

> Charlie Mason and Joe Sullivan did a great job coordinating our hosts and layouts for this year, despite many challenges. Craig Knox completed all of our video projects, and will be working with Bob Kelshaw to prep them for posting to the Pilgrimage website by the scheduled date for these (all on 10/23/21). Tom Gordon has taken care of covering our "operator assistant" needs, with a much greater supply of volunteers than the few that were needed. Based on my count of current postings, Jim Foley has taken in 28 paid "pike ads" from our Pilgrimage "supporters". Sally Bando is taking care of our Facebook marketing and so forth, and since the last meeting, Doug Alexander prepared a Piedmont Pilgrimage flyer for distribution to hobby shops, etc.

I do want to give a very big THANK YOU to our participating layout owners/hosts and our Committee members for all of the work and preparation that has gone into this year's effort. Makes things considerably easier on me.

2021 Piedmont Model Train Show Was A Great Success

On October 2 and 3, 2021, The Piedmont Division held a train show at the Clarence Brown Conference Center in Cartersville, Georgia. It was a great time and fun was had by all. Volunteers were one of the big reasons that load-in and load-out were accomplished efficiently. <u>Forty-one volunteers</u> gave their time and muscle to the event. Volunteers did everything from selling tickets to loading and unloading vehicles. They were the heroes of the day. I made the mistake of

This was a change of venue from previous train shows. The venue was changed due to two major reasons:

- 1. The Piedmont Division could not afford another cancelled event at the Galleria. The upfront costs at the conference center were approximately half of those at the Galleria.
- 2. Vendors were not happy with the logistics of getting in and out of the Galleria.

The Clarence Brown Conference Center offered a smaller venue, resulting in the costs being less therefore lessening the risk posed by cancellation. COVID-19 was still present but the committee decided to move forward after two previously planned show were cancelled.

State of Georgia guidelines were followed at the show to abate the threat of COVID as best as possible. Masks were available to those who chose to wear them. Hand sanitizer stations were also present.

Vendors were very happy with the venue

and the ease with which they could unload and load. Kudos to Perry Lamb who kept the traffic outside moving so that no vendor waited very long. I believe that no vendor waited more than 15 minutes to unload. Exhibitors were also very pleased with the venue and the dock facilities.

Parking was provided for free for the vendors and exhibitors next to the building. Trucks and trailers were accommodated in a secure space close to the loading docks.

Even with the great exposure, we fell short of the attendance numbers for which we hoped. <u>Attendance was 841</u> while we expected 1,000. We believe that COVID still played a large part in us not achieving our goal. With the same effort that we put forth for the October 2021 Show, we should easily attain our goal in future shows.

Best of all, the Show yielded a net profit for the Division of over \$4,300.

Planning is already underway for the 2022 Model Train Show on March 12-13 again at the Clarence Brown Conference Center in Cartersville, Georgia.

Piedmont Division's October Meeting John Bost: Weathering





John Bost brought in a diorama featuring a \$5 AMT model of an old pick-up truck, that he weathered into an old broken down vehicle that may have died on that very spot.

He then took us step-by-step as to how he attained these effects. The model was highly detailed, even with springs that wore through the seats.

He primed the vehicle with a rattle-can rust colored primer, After it cured he sprayed on a quality hair spray that has a very fine mist of the adhesive. He then top coats it with the faded paint vehicle color.

He described several processes he used to remove the vehicle color to reveal the rust underneath.

He described several ways he tried to remove the top coat: water/ alcohol mix, heavily used paint brushes reduced to a 1/16" stubble, den-

tal picks and 400/600 grit sand paper.






CINCINNATI DIVISION OFFERING WOODEN BOX CAR KITS

Cincinnati Division 7 is a large and very active Division in the Mid Central Region, and is centered around the greater Cincinnati, OH area and includes portions of Indiana and Kentucky.

They are offering HO VIRGINIAN & OHIO 36' WOODEN BOXCAR KITS: In 1923, the Miami Valley Railroad, a subsidiary of the Virginian & Ohio, ordered 50 boxcars from American Car and Foundry. These cars had an inside length of 36' 5", an inside height of 8' 4", an inside width of 8' 6", and a capacity of 2580 cubic feet. They featured Hutchinson steel roofs, 7/7 inverted rib steel ends, seven-foot wooden doors, Andrews trucks, and K-style air brakes. The cars were delivered with MVR reporting marks.





The V&O also ordered 34 of these cars, which were delivered in V&O livery and carried V&O reporting marks. Some of these cars were rebuilt at the West Carroll-ton shops in July, 1940 in the buildup to World War II. The last of these cars continued in service until late 1952. V&O Tool Car No. 435 was rebuilt at West Carrollton in December, 1946. It continued in service on the V&O into the late 1960s.

Manufactured in the USA by Accurail, these Limited Edition HO Scale Car Kits were designed by W. Allen McClelland and produced with his permission by Cincinnati Division 7, Mid Central Region, NMRA, Inc.

Red V&O #3357 dated 1940	Gray V&O MOW #435

His layout is a point-to-point design with return loops at each end.




One of the most striking features is a forested hillside that is the source for one of his mines.

Ken also has a great selection of period N scale autos and trucks to add realism and interest












Ken also enjoys passenger trains so a large terminal is included.







Passenger trains not currently on the layout are in wall-mounted displays.





Getting Wired

WITH TOM GORDON

Cheap Fascia Panels

I personally like panels on the fascia to control turnouts. Some folks like turnouts to be all manual, but due to some personality quirk, I want all my turnouts to be controlled via some sort of machine. That, in turn, requires some sort of electronic interface.

In the past, I have built panels that control an entire area with loads of turnouts, but on my new layout, I'm trying my best to simplify the operator interface, and also to make the panels easier to modify.

To do this, I purchased a hundred or so thin wooden squares from (surprise!) Amazon. I selected 4" x 4" thin wood squares that are used for coasters and other craft projects. (The specific ones I bought aren't available, but many more are.) Granted, I had to purchase way more squares than I'll ever need, but they allow me to put one or two turnouts in a diagram and include the buttons to



control them. Yes, this requires lots of wire to each panel, but this approach seems to work nicely. **I've includ**ed a pic-

ture of the front and back to show how they look on the layout.

To build these, I primed and painted the background of the squares a nice glossy green, used 3M spray adhesive to glue on a printed diagram and sealed the panel with several coats of Krylon clear gloss spray. Buttons, toggles and LED's were mounted on the thin wood with ease after the appropriate holes were drilled. How you wire this is up to you, but it is a cheap approach to have fascia control. As for specific paints, I'll let that be up to you, but the Krylon worked nicely. I did seal the printed paper with Grumbacher fixative, but that might not be truly necessary. I did this to prevent the inkjet colors from running.

As for the electrical hardware, I use pushbuttons from Mouser Electronics (part 104-0013-EVX) bought in quantities of 50 (I should have gotten 100 @ about a buck each). Make sure the throat (threaded part) of whatever you use is long enough to poke through the wood. I use small LED mounting collars (Jameco part 95513 for T1 LED's) to simplify mounting the lights.

Now there is the issue of what to do in order to prevent accidental throwing of the turnouts. Well, since I use JMRI, I can program the panels to go into a 'spectator' mode where guests can't accidentally push a button and cause a problem. When a button is pressed, a variable can be checked to



see if it's OK before performing that function. This will ultimately be tied into a dispatch station where the dispatcher can give a road crew permission to control a particular area via a toggle switch or some other device. There is an LED on each panel to indicate if it is in local control.

Now here's the overall advantage: If I should want to change things, or modify controls on a panel, replacement is fairly easy. I use DuPont plugs to connect the panel from the back, and I can create a new panel in a matter of days. It's also handy if you want to change the lettering or the diagram to make control clearer.

Regardless, this is a cheap way to make panels, and so far, they seem to work well. This can work with any technology behind the scenes, even direct wiring to track power.

Give it a try!
